PUGILATO

The 1984 edition of La "Bibbia" del Pugilato is now available. In addition to its excellent coverage of the records of worldwide boxers, it contains such features as a brief dictionary of boxing terms in five languages; scale of weight equivalents in kilograms, pounds and stones; bout by bout histories of the world championships, European championships and Italian championships and biographies of noted referees, managers and journalists (including several IBRO members).

The 750 page soft cover book can be ordered from Dott. Giuseppe Ballarati, Via Giacomo della Marca, 43 - 00126 Acilia, Roma, Italia. Its price is \$20 U.S. currency or equivalent. Previous editions from 1980-83 are still available and are also priced at \$20. The 1976 edition is available for \$12 and the 1978 edition is priced at \$13. The 1979 edition priced at \$18, contains 300 pages devoted to boxers of the past, called "the Golden Pages", in addition to the records of current-day boxers.

For all serious students of boxing, Pugilato is a must.

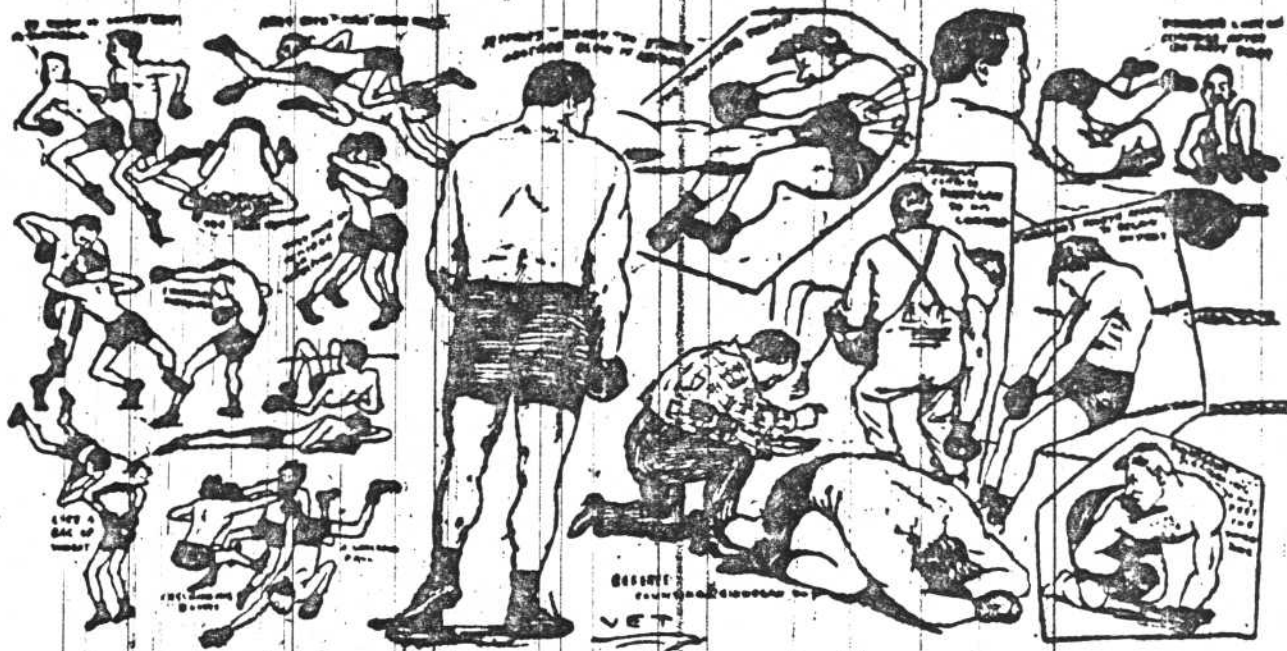

JEFF'S HARD LEFT

Put Finnegan Out After 55 Seconds of Fighting.

The Champion Had the Snap of His Life Last Night.

He Hadn't Started to Sweat When It Was All Over.

Jim Jeffries, the elephant champion of all the heavies, broke into Rockefeller's class last night. He gathered in just a fraction less than \$150 a second for nearly a minute, \$100 being paid him for toppling over John Finnegan, the pride of Pittsburgh. Unlike the Standard oil mogul, Jeffries' sweat make that much every second of the day, but he was a circus while it lasted, then packed his grip and hustled for the east-bound train at the Michigan Central.

There was a big crowd at the Light Guard armory, but it was not up to the numerical standard of the Sharkey-Jeffries show. All the leading sporting lights were there, including many from out of the city and a bunch from Saginaw having money to burn on one of the preliminaries. The veteran referee, George Siler, picked out the winners, and as usual his work was enthusiastic and good.

and William A. Brady sat in the corner, turned pale quietly smoking a cigar. Jeffries was as big as a house, 114 said he weighed 211 during the day, but his appearance indicated something nearer to 250.

Finnegan had on a sweater and trousers and seemed free enough when he took his corner, being supported by F. McCormick, of Pittsburg, Bartley McSweney, of Mt. Clemens, Johnny Van Hiest and Jim Riley. There had been an argument over gloves in the dressing room and Finnegan would not let Jeffries wear an old pair which the champion had in his grip. The new gloves were too small, and the men finally put on a pair which had been used in other contests. Siler told them there must be no hitting with one hand free, and that each man should protect himself in the breakaway. As they stood on the floor Finnegan's front looked more as though he had trained on schupers than the boulevard, for he was in anything but good shape. He weighed 150 pounds.

On the top of the bell Jeffries hurried crouching to the center of the ring with Finnegan dancing about and looking as though he did not know his bearings. Jeff feinted once or twice, and Finnegan let go a swing, which was blocked, then Jeff put the left to the face and ripped up two more to the same place, the last one sending Finnegan into a tangle with the ropes.

The Irishman stayed down, but three seconds and jumped up, but Jeff was right there, and in an instant another left rested on his head and over he went again, taking only a short count. Jeff gave him no rest, and by this time Finnegan had a "lost-strayed-or-stolen" look on his face. He made a wild swing, and Jeff beat a tattoo on his jaw and wind, putting him down hard. Finnegan rested a little longer this time, but when he got up Jeff rushed into close quarters, and with a left upper cut to the wind he raised the Pittsburger off his feet. Finnegan landed on his hands and knees and started to arise at the count, but fell back and Siler held him until McCormick came and picked him up in his arms like a child, carrying him to his corner.

The bout lasted 55 seconds, and big Jeffries waved his hands to the crowd, laughing as he pushed toward the dressing room.

FINNEGAN WAS "SASSY."

"I wouldn't have rashed him like that if he hadn't made me mad," said Jeffries, who was getting into his street clothes. "He was too fresh about the gloves, and I didn't like his sass. I told Brady I would knock him out inside of a minute. If he had been a decent fellow I would have allowed him to stay a while and done some boxing. Maybe he'll behave next time."

The best scrap of the night was the opener between "Scotty" Cross and George Gibbs, of Cleveland. Gibbs had the advantage of weight and height, and looked to be a very good colored man. His fights with both hands, and in addition to being clever, he can punch hard. Cross started mixing as usual, but Gibbs had the better of the opening round. Cross would not be denied and made Gibbs weary in the second, but in the next Cross was in a bad way. Cross was almost out at the end of the fourth, and the fifth was tame. In the sixth they had gone a minute and three-quarters when Gibbs landed a right uppercut to the wind and sent Cross to the mat. The Scotchman could not get up and was counted out.

Stackhouse and Pendergast put up a very bad fight. The Saginaw push had bet a lot of money on their man, who won on points, as Stackhouse had no steam after the second round. Stackhouse's only chance was in rushing,

but he could not keep it up. Pendergast has a very long reach, and it helped him win. He uses an outcurve with the right which tips him off as not much of a boxer, and he is too prone to want decisions on a foul. In the ninth Stackhouse had the better of some mixing, but failed to keep on, and the decision went to the visitor.

In newsletter #11 (March, 1984), Eric Armit was looking for substantiation of the time of the bout in which Jim Jeffries knocked out John Finnegan in 0:55 of the first round. Julius Weiner provided a copy of The Evening News, a Detroit newspaper, for Saturday, April 7, 1900. Bill Schutte also provided a report of the bout from the April 7th issue of The Oregonian, a Portland, Oregon newspaper.

The text of the Evening News article follows:

Jim Jeffries, the elephantine champion of all the heavies, broke into Rockefeller's class last night. He gathered in just a fraction less than \$21.82 a second for nearly a minute, \$1,200 being paid him for toppling over John Finnegan, the pride of Pittsburg. Unlike the Standard oil mogul, Jeffries doesn't make that much every second of the day, but he was a Croesus while it lasted, then packed his grip and hustled for the eastbound train at the Michigan Central.

There was a big crowd at the Light Guard armory, but it was not up to the numerical standard of the Sharkey-Jeffords show. All the leading sporting lights were there including many from out of the city and a bunch from Saginaw having money to burn on one of the preliminaries. The veteran referee, George Siler, picked out the winners, and as usual his work was emphatic and good.

BOWEN AND BURKE.

At Press Time There Was No Signs of a Decision.

NEW ORLEANS, April 6.—In the Olympic Club tonight Andy Bowen, of this city, and Jack Burke, of Texas, fought for the light-weight championship of the South and a purse of \$2500, of which \$500 went to the loser. The fight was before the largest crowd ever assembled in the arena of the Olympic Club. Both men were in perfect condition. The betting was slightly in favor of Bowen. In the opening rounds the fight was well worth seeing, though Bowen was warned against fouling by Referee Duffy. He was inclined to do some unfair work when in a clinch. Burke was allowed first blood in the second round, but was immediately afterward fought to the ropes. Burke caught Bowen with his right on the nose in the eighth round. This was the hardest blow of the fight. In the 22d, Burke half fell and was half punched down. Bowen was twice knocked down in the succeeding round. In the 25th Bowen was nearly knocked down again, but his opponent failed to follow up the advantage. From the 26th to the 28th rounds the honors were easy, and from the 29th to the 36th nothing but misses characterized the fight. The men were clumsy beyond comparison. There was really nothing done until the 45th round, when the fighting grew hot. Bowen knocked Burke down in the 48th, but the gong save him. In the 49th and succeeding rounds Bowen went at Burke fast and furiously, but while Burke was very weak, the home man's judgment was poor. During the 57th the audience called for a draw, but Captain Barrett said there should be no draw when the fight was not brutal. From the 58th to the 62d round the fight looked queer and many thought it was a fake.

THE MEN STILL FIGHTING.

NEW ORLEANS, April 7.—From rounds 72 to 93, inclusive, nothing but poor judgment was displayed by either of the pugilists and the spectators were growing very weary. At 3:40 A. M. there seems to be no immediate prospect of the referee rendering a decision.

JEFFRIES IN THE RING.

Put Out a Pittsburg Man in Short Order at Detroit.

DETROIT, April 6.—Champion James J. Jeffries knocked out John Finnegan, of Pittsburg, tonight before the Cadillac Athletic Club, in 55 seconds. Finnegan landed the first blow as they came to the center of the ring, and Jeffries then put his left on the Pittsburg man's jaw and he went to the floor. Finnegan came up in a few seconds, only to be sent to the floor again with a blow in the same place. He stayed down longer this time, and when he again rose he was in visible distress. He had hardly assumed a fighting position before the champion put his left in the pit of his stomach, and Finnegan went down, completely out. Referee Siler counted the seconds off, and when he stepped back it was seen that Finnegan was crying. He staggered to his feet, rolled against the ropes, and his seconds rushed into the ring and carried him to his corner. It was several minutes before he recovered sufficiently to leave the ring.

Oregonian - Apr 7, 1900

THE BOWEN-BURKE FIGHT.

Declared No Contest After One Hundred and Ten Rounds.

NEW ORLEANS, April 7.—The Bowen-Burke fight was not ended until the 110th round, when the referee declared it no contest. Very little fighting was done after the 93d round. Bowen, from that time until the finish, was the aggressor, and whenever any fighting was to be done, landed now and then on Burke's body, but was unable to do any damage. Burke's hands were practically useless, and he only prodded at Bowen to keep him guessing, not with any idea of being able to knock him out. In the 105th round Bowen fell heavily from the momentum of his own weight, but did not hurt himself. In response to vehement demands of the crowd, the referee in the 108th round announced that unless something was done in the next two rounds he would stop the fight and declare it no contest. This only made both men cautious. Bowen did not dare to force the fighting. At the 110th round the referee declared the fight no contest. Bowen protested without avail. He was unmarked and fresh. Burke was badly punished about the body, and some bones of both hands seemed broken. His wrists were much swollen, and he suffered considerable pain. He wants to fight Bowen again, but President Dickinson says the club will not make a new match.

He had hardly assumed a fighting position before the champion put his left in the pit of his stomach and Finnegan went down completely out. It was several minutes before he recovered sufficiently to leave the ring. Jeffries said he weighed 220, Finnegan weighed but 190, and looked like a boy beside the champion.

LONG-STANDING MYSTERY SOLVED.
"NEW" 1929 FIGHT FOR MANDELL
DISCOVERED, AND VERIFIED.

About three years ago I was asked to do some research into the early record of former lightweight king, the late Sammy Mandell. This research involved going thru microfilms of the Chicago Tribune, mainly, plus other Chicago newspapers, starting with the year 1920; Mandell's first pro year. This pursuit of the truth turned up many previously undiscovered fights for Mandell; principally for the years 1920 thru 1924.

However, while doing research on other matters, for years in the 1930s, other "new" fights were discovered for Mandell; beginning in 1933 and extending into 1934, when he finally called it quits. As a consequence, Mandell's career and all of its bright and not-so-bright moments became a further challenge. The challenge lay in finding out more about the fighter who was called "The Rockford Shiek". What was there about him, that made him so successful up to 1930; and why did he spend the next four years sliding downhill, without regaining the limelight?

A veteran Chicago Daily News sportswriter, Mike Murphy, told me he had written a four-part life story of Mandell, that appeared in the Chicago Daily News, starting on July 20, 1929. This series ran just prior to Mandell's successful title defense against Tony Canzoneri, in Chicago, on August 2, 1929. In studying the microfilm of Murphy's articles, which furnished a few clues on his first pro year in 1920, there was also time to study Murphy's daily stories on the upcoming fight. In one of these stories Murphy mentioned that Mandell had had his last tune-up fight for his title defense, on June 20, 1929, in Jackson, Michigan, against Tony Lombardo.

But- there was no such fight shown in Mandell's record anywhere; not in the Ring Record Book, not in T.S. Andrews, not in Everlast. And a search through each of the Chicago newspapers, on microfilm, didn't turn up a result mention for this fight. Indeed, the New York Times didn't have this result; neither did the San Francisco Chronicle; nor the Peoria Journal.

So, here was a mystery. Was Mike Murphy's story in the Chicago Daily News correct, and did Sammy Mandell fight in Jackson, Michigan on June 20, 1929? How could this mystery be solved?

On March 17, 1984 I wrote to the Reference Librarian of the Jackson Citizen Patriot newspaper, in Jackson, Michigan. I explained the background of the mystery and asked help in verifying that Mandell fought in Jackson on the date in question.

Finally, on Thursday April 26 the long-standing mystery was solved. A letter arrived from the Jackson District Library, not from the newspaper, in Jackson, Michigan. The letter was from the library's reference librarian, and said: "Please find enclosed a photostatic copy of the Jackson Citizen Patriot for June 21, 1929. I hope this is of help to you in your research."

The photostat was headlined- "Sammy Mandell batters-" but that's all there was to the top. However, the story was all there, including a round-by-round report of the action. The headline on top of the story said- "Toledo Boxer Fights Gamely to Stay Limit. Champion unable to deliver knockout despite best efforts."

The story went on- "Sammy Mandell, world's lightweight champion, easily outfought Tony Lombardo of Toledo in nine out of ten rounds of their boxing bout, staged by the Jackson Athletic Club at the fairground Thursday night."

"Lombardo, battered and bleeding, and at times all but helpless before the champion's battering blows, fought gamely through the whole 10 rounds, at times forcing the fighting himself, and during his groggiest moments foiling Sammy's most determined efforts to knock him out."

"And at the close of the fight, when Lombardo staggered to his feet and prepared to leave the ring, the crowd wildly applauded his gameness and his fighting ability which, though not good enough for Mandell, permitted him to stand up at times and make a real showing against the champion."

Lombardo's best round was the first, holding Mandell even; but from then on Sammy's greater experience and skill cut Tony to ribbons. Tony's nose bled profusely from the fourth round on and at the end of the fight was carrying on with both eyes virtually swollen shut.

So, everyone can add this 1929 bout to Mandell's record; as one of thirteen he had that year. The 1983 Ring Record Book however, only shows eleven bouts; they also didn't show Mandell's August 28, 1929 bout at Petoskey, Michigan against Frankie Frisco, in which he scored a three round knockout.

Mandell also had eleven bouts in 1933; not the mere two bouts shown in Ring. Here are these eleven bouts:

My record total for Mandell now shows 191 bouts. The 1983 Ring shows 168 bouts. All of the additional bouts that I have found for Mandell have previously been submitted to Ring for inclusion in their next record book, hopefully. Now this June 20, 1929 bout in Jackson, Michigan can also be added to Mandell's record, for the 1984 Ring Record Book.

Even with all of the research already done on Mandell's record, by myself and others, I have a hunch there are more Mandell fights that never got into any record books. Some day soon I hope to be able to go thru microfilm of the Rockford, Illinois newspaper, Mandell's hometown; to see if their reporting on Mandell's career progress might not turn up a few more "new" fights for Sammy.

Some records, from Laurence Fielding.

Generally, it has been the rule, that if a boxer is good enough to be rated in the "first ten", by the Ring, Everlast, or NBA, his record will appear in at least one record book. However, there have been some surprising exceptions to this rule. Some of the fighters of the 1920's who made the ratings but not the record books were: Cuban Bobby Brown, Johnny Burns, Allentown Joe Gans, Doc Conrad, Eddie Shevlin, Johnny Drew, Harold Smith, Joe Rychell, Jimmy Russo, Young Dencio, Ernie Jarvis, Alex Burley, and Ruby Bradley. In the Ring's 1924 ratings, Eddie Shevlin is the No. 9 welter. He beat Jimmy Jones, George Ward, Dave Shade, and Paul Doyle. Here is his (incomplete) record:

ADDITIONS OR CORRECTIONS:

In the November 1926 Ring, page 32, in the Southeastern Kansas notes of Jess Risner, it is stated that Bradford Simmons of Tulsa won a decision in ten rounds from Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion. The date is not given, but it was probably in September. The place was Drumright, Okla. This should be added to Johnson's record, 1983 RRB, page 566. The article uses the word "decision", but it seems that some of the Ring reporters and newspaper reporters often used that word in those days, even where there was no official decision.

In the 1924 record of Honeyboy Finnegan (1983 RRB, page 836), the date of his KO of Chick Ward was June 16, and his KO of Kid Peck was on July 9. Both fights were at Kenilworth, Md. The date of the fight shown with Goldie Ahearn was Oct. 3, but they had another fight before that one, on Aug. 29, 1924, also at Washington, a 10 rounder, with the same result, a newspaper win for Finnegan. The date of their third fight was Apr. 15, 1925. The date of his 1925 fight with Lew Mayrs was Jan. 14, and the one with Tommy Noble was Mar. 16. On Dec. 18, 1925 he won on a foul from Bobby Garcia in 6 rounds at New York, and he also beat Garcia by decision in 12 rounds at Berwyn, Md. on Aug. 16, 1923, so these two fights should be added to his record. In his 1924 record, the fight with Andy Bowen should be erased. The result is right, but it took place on Oct. 18, 1923 at Berwyn, Md. These dates are from the Washington Star and Washington Post.

HALL OF FAME RESULTS

The results of the balloting for the Boxing Hall of Fame can be interpreted in one of two ways. Although the Hall of Fame already has over 150 members, apparently there are many more boxers who merit inclusion. Or there are no standouts who have not been enshrined.

Of the 50 men listed on the ballot, 41 received votes. In addition, there were 11 write-ins. As a result of the diversified voting, no one received the required 75%. Changes to the election format will be considered for next year's election but the official result of the 1984 election is that no new members will be added to the old-timers group of the Boxing Hall of Fame in 1984.

Two Additional Knockouts of Joe Jeannette
Bruce Harris*

The Ring Record Book reveals that in over 150 fights, heavyweight Hall of Famer Joe Jeannette was knocked out only once. This occurred in the 10th round of a bout with Sam Langford on May 13, 1916 in Syracuse, New York. This is a phenomenal record, strengthened by the fact that Jeannette faced the Boston Tar Baby over ten times. And, during his 15-year career (1904-1919), he met on several occasions the likes of Jack Johnson and Sam McVey.

To date, two additional knockouts of Joe Jeannette have come to light, and both occurred in early rounds. The first took place in Philadelphia on April 20, 1905, when Black Bill put Jeannette to sleep in two rounds.

Two Additional Knockouts of Joe Jeannette (cont.)

The second KO occurred in a very unusual fight on July 15, 1914. Jeannette was knocked out by Battling Jim Johnson in one round. This is the same Jim Johnson who, fighting out of a Jim Jeffries-type crouch, nearly defeated heavyweight champ Jack Johnson on December 19, 1913 in Paris, France. The fight in question took place at the Stadium Athletic Center in New York City and is officially listed in Jeannette's record as a 10-round No Decision contest. Unfortunately, the record of Battling Jim Johnson is unknown. The fight is particularly interesting because, according to The Brooklyn Daily Eagle, referee Billy Joh believed that the crowd wanted more for its money than simply a 1-round knockout. Referee Joh counted Jeannette out, then compelled the two fighters to continue with the scheduled 10-round affair. Jeannette was brought to and he and Johnson battled for 10 rounds. The New York Times called the fight a draw, while The Brooklyn Daily Eagle gave Johnson the decision.

Further research will no doubt reveal additional fights involving the great Joe Jeannette. It is hoped that boxing historians will also uncover more information about the ring career of one of boxing's great unsung heroes, Battling Jim Johnson.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS: Bob Soderman and Herb Goldman supplied information included in this record.

COMMENTS: This record shows a number of bouts often omitted from Slattery's record: e.g. Billy McGowan (4/20/25), Bing Conley (6/22/25), and Eddie Connors (12/23/29).

Slattery did not meet Jack Gibbons in 1934, as usually shown in his record. Gibbons met instead "Young" Jimmy Slattery.

I consider the entry of 6/1/34, Slattery's supposed two-round knockout of Gus Flugel, to be doubtful. This needs to be checked out in a Buffalo newspaper.

"Jack" Vascher and "Johnny" Vascher, mentioned in Slattery records, were names of the same man.

It is probable that all of Slattery's 1921-23 fights that show no location actually occurred in Buffalo. Of course, this needs newspaper verification.

This record contains many corrections of names and dates. For example, Slattery's opponent of 11/30/22 was Sammy Gilbert, not "Woebert" or "Weebert" (see results listings in THE RING, January 1923). Another example of a correction: the date of Slattery's fight in January 1925 with Roland Todd is usually given incorrectly as January 16, but actually occurred on the 19th.

Additions and corrections to this record will be appreciated.

COMMENTS ON RECORD OF TONY GALENTO

3. I have omitted all of Galento's "comeback" fights, 1943 and afterwards, except for the one with Herbie Katz. Other than the bout with Katz, Galento met only wrestlers in his comeback. We have to draw the line somewhere as to what constitutes a genuine professional boxing contest.

COMMENTS FROM POLAND - Dr. Jan Skotnicki

I'm very happy to become a member of IBRO. I've been interested in professional boxing since 1958 and have a magnificent collection of boxing books, magazines and especially ring records of old time heroes. My collection is the greatest in all the socialist countries and one of the biggest in the world, though such men as Lockett Davis, Bob Bottomley, David Bloch, Bill Schutte, Tracy Callis, Michel Gladu, Ray Mitchell, Ron Jackson, Stanley Pratt and John Hogg whom I correspond with, and many others especially in America, Canada and Western Europe have much more material in their home libraries. I'm in a very hard situation as a pro-boxing fan because my country is behind "the Iron Curtain". There are no pro boxing bouts held here in Poland and amateur boxing is not our favorite sport either. You probably can't believe that only ONE fight for the heavyweight championship was shown on TV here since 1956. (Ali-Foreman. 1974).

I can't send any foreign money from here and our currency is not transferable. All books and other material I got were obtained in return for Polish books, stamps, First Day Covers postcards, military medals and memorabilia. Moreover, I can't visit any country without special permission. To western countries I need an invitation with repayment of travel costs and guarantees of accomodation and meals. Add to this - it is an every day problem to buy anything. This is my life.

I would like to obtain answers for the following:

1 - Nat Fleischer in Black Dynamite, volume IV says that Denver Ed Martin was the winner in his fight with Sandy Ferguson (London, 1902) and the ring record of Sandy Ferguson published in the 1942 Ring Record Book says that he knocked out his man in the fifth round. What is the truth?

2 - When and where did the bout take place in which Denver Ed Martin won the Colored Championship in 6 rounds from Frank Childs?

3 - On March 3, 1930, in Jersey City, Humberto Arce, heavyweight champion of Puerto Rico outpointed Stanley Perada in 8 rounds. Was Perada the same man as the famous Stanley Poreda who was born in Jersey City? (See Everlast Boxing Record Book for 1931 page 157 - Arce's record, and page 143 - Poreda's record in which this fight is omitted).

ALLENTOWN JOE GANS

In his notes accompanying his submission of the record of Allentown Joe Gans, Laurence Fielding raises some questions as to the identity problems in constructing the record. Lockett Davis, in his new role as chairman of the records review committee, was able to shed some light on some of the problems and consequently, the record appearing in this newsletter is a composite of their work.

Laurence Fielding points out that occasionally Gans' given name of Joe Hicks was used and the record of Augie Ratner shows a loss to Joe Hicks on Nov. 14, 1924. Lockett Davis confirmed that, indeed, that bout should be on Gans' record. A second source of confusion was the Tiger Flowers bout at Wilkes-Barre on April 16, 1926. The 1983 RRB lists the opponent as Panama Joe Gans. The 1927 Everlast lists the opponent as Allentown Joe Gans. The 1927 Andrews book simply says Joe Gans. Lockett Davis is "sure that it was Allentown Joe Gans that Flowers fought; that was Allentown Joe's bailiwick."

Mr. Fielding concurs, stating, "Panama Joe Gans was still around in April, 1926, but was probably in Cuba. In the May, 1926 Ring, in Milt Baron's "Boxing in Cuba", page 33, it is reported that he lost to Kid Charol, in 12 rounds. In the June, 1926 Ring, page 32, it is reported that he kayoed Martin Perez in 5 rounds. These two fights should be added to Panama Joe's record for 1926, in the 1941 RRB, page 171-72. That record does show him losing to Flowers on Apr. 16, but that was probably taken from Flowers' record, which may be wrong. Note that the 1926 record of Panama Joe Gans in the 1927 Everlast, page 144, does not show him fighting anybody on April 16."

"In the 1920's there were Allentown, Panama, and Italian Joe Ganses. Also there was Baby Joe Gans, real name Gerald Slaughter, who had many fights in California, and there was another man who used the California Joe Gans who was originally from Gary, Indiana. All very confusing."

Lockett Davis adds, "Two more 'Joe Gans' of the same period were Nobby Joe Gans and Dago Joe Gans, both pretty good fighters. There were others who were less well known."

Hickel won the Kansas Golden Gloves welterweight title in 1938.
